LOST PROPERTY COLLECTION

As we approach the end of term, we would like to remind you to check our lost property collection, which is vast!

We have a significant amount of clothing that has not yet been claimed. If your child has misplaced any items, please check lost property- situated outside the school hall.

Please note that any remaining clothing will be donated to charity at the end of term. Thank you for your support in helping us find these items a new home!

PARKING

Dangerous parking practices are putting our children's lives at risk, and we urgently need your cooperation to keep everyone safe.

We have observed vehicles:

- Parking on double yellow lines outside the school entrance
- Stopping on the **tight corner** near the school gates
- Creating traffic backlogs that bring vehicles to a complete standstill
- Making it extremely dangerous for families to cross the road safely
- Driving across grass verges

These parking behaviours are not only inconsiderate – **they are illegal and potentially life-threatening** for our children and families.

It's important to understand that:

- Parking on double yellow lines is incredibly dangerous
- Stopping on corners reduces visibility for drivers, pedestrians and cyclists
- Obstructing the highway can lead to prosecution
- Endangering children through dangerous parking is a serious offence

We have informed and are working closely with:

- Our local MP who has been made aware of the situation
- East Sussex County Council Highways
 who are monitoring the area
- Sussex Police

What You Can Do

Please help us keep our children safe by:

- Arriving earlier to find legal parking spaces further from school
- Never parking on double yellow lines or on corners
- Walking or cycling to school where possible
- Parking considerately in residential areas, respecting residents' driveways
- Allowing extra time for your journey to avoid rushing

Alternative Options

- Park and stride parking 5-10 minutes away and walking the rest
- Car sharing with other families
- Cycling: we have secure bike storage

Blue Badge Holders

If you hold a blue badge and are unsure about where you can park, please visit The Blue Badge scheme: rights and responsibilities in England - GOV.UK for further guidance. Below is the guidance taken directly from this document for further clarification. We respectfully ask blue badge holders not to park on the double yellow lines opposite the school entrance.

Your Child's Life is Worth Five Extra Minutes

We understand that mornings are busy, but **no appointment or deadline is worth risking a child's life**. Please park sensibly and safely – every single time.

If you do witness dangerous or antisocial driving, we have been advised that the best course of action is to report it to – **Operation Crackdown-Operation Crackdown.**

Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

The children attending Monday Mindfulness Club have been finding a moment of calm after a busy day.

Developing their feelings of self-belief, and recognising their personal strengths. The children have fully immersed themselves in their favourite mindfulness breathing technics, whilst enjoying fun and creative sensory play.



WOW - THE WALK TO SCHOOL CHALLENGE

We have chosen to be part of an exciting initiative to encourage more children and their families to walk to school.

WOW – the walk to school challenge is delivered by Living Streets, the UK charity for everyday walking, to help as many children as possible experience the benefits of walking or wheeling to school.

The pupil-led challenge enables children to self-report how they get to school every day. If they travel actively (walk/wheel, cycle, scoot, 'Park and Stride' or hop off) at least once a week, for a month, they get rewarded with a badge. It's that simple!

What are the benefits of walking to school?

- Children feel happier and healthier
- They arrive at school refreshed and ready to learn
- Helps reduce congestion and pollution at the school gates

What if we can't walk to school?

If driving, 'Park and Stride' to help your child earn their WOW badges. Park at least ten minutes away from the school and walk or wheel the remaining journey.

If using public transport, hop off at least ten minutes away and walk the rest of the way (recorded as 'other' on the WOW Travel Tracker).

Where walking to school isn't an option. we work with schools to establish a bespoke approach to WOW that works best for their pupils' needs. This includes pupils becoming WOW Ambassadors, leading assemblies, creating active travel notice boards, and other activities within the school day.

What is a WOW badge?

There are 11 badges to be earned from September 2025 – July 2026. Each badge has been designed by a pupil as part of our annual WOW Badge Design Competition. A new badge can be earned every month if pupils walk/wheel, cycle, scoot, 'Park and Stride' or hop off at least once a week

WOW 2025/26 encourages pupils to Walk with Joy, with badges depicting everything from jumping in puddles to painting.

The badges are made in Cornwall from material that was otherwise destined for landfill, including fridge trays, plastic plates and yoghurt pot off-cuts. For more information, visit:

EXPLANATION OF TRAVEL MODES ON THE WOW TRAVEL TRACKER



Cycle: Select this icon if you have cycled all the way to school, 'Cycle' counts as an active journey and contributes towards earning a badge.

Other: This icon counts as an active travel trip and will contribute towards earning a badge. Choose this for any active journey that does not fit into the other categories.



Walk/Wheel: Select this icon if you have walked or wheeled all the way to school. We support disabled pupils and those with special educational needs to enjoy walking. This icon includes pupils walking with the use of mobility aids, including wheelchairs or wheeled walkers. 'Walk/ Wheel' counts as an active journey and contributes towards earning a badge.



Park and Stride: Park and Stride is a great way for pupils who live too far away from school to still earn a badge. Simply park the car at least 10 minutes away from school and complete the journey by foot, wheelchair, bike or scooter (any active mode of travel used to complete the journey counts!). 'Park and Stride' counts as an active journey and contributes towards earning a badge.



Bus: Select this icon if you took the bus (including school bus) or used public transport to get to school. 'Bus' does not count as an active journey. so it will not contribute towards earning a badge. If you choose to use public transport but still want to earn a badge, you can hop off at least 10 minutes from school and walk the rest of the way. If you choose to do so, instead of 'Bus' select 'Other'.



Driven: Select this icon if you drove all the way to school. 'Driven' does not count as an active journey so it will not contribute towards earning a badge.





Absent: Select this icon for any pupils who are absent (for every day of their absence). It is important absences are recorded correctly to give pupils a fair chance to earn a badge.

Delete: If you accidentally select the wrong travel mode, use the delete icon to clear it and start again.







Taxi: Select this icon if you travel by taxi the whole way to school. 'Taxi' does not count as an active journey so it will not contribute towards earning a badge.

WE'RE HERE TO HELP

How to Share Worries, Concerns and Feedback... We're Here to Help

At Polegate Primary School, communication is key to ensuring successful and happy children.

We want every child to thrive, and we know that sometimes concerns arise that need to be addressed quickly and effectively.

We value all feedback from our families and want to make sure you always know who to speak to when you have a worry or concern about your child.

We've created a simple flowchart to help you understand the best route for raising concerns:

Step 1: Start with Your Child's Class Teacher

For most concerns, your first point of contact should always be your child's class teacher. This includes:

- Wellbeing concerns if your child seems worried, anxious or unhappy
- Friendship issues problems with peers or social situations
- Learning concerns questions about your child's progress or work
- Day-to-day matters uniform, homework, classroom issues

Your child's class teacher knows them best and sees them every day. They are usually best placed to understand the situation and work with you to find a solution.

How to contact class teachers:

- Speak to them at pick-up time
- Send an email
- Request a phone call or meeting for more detailed discussions

Step 2: If Concerns Continue or Escalate - Contact Your Leader of Learning

If you've spoken to the class teacher and:

- The issue hasn't been resolved
- You have heightened concerns that need additional support
- The matter requires senior leadership input

Our Leaders of Learning oversee the curriculum, pastoral care and wellbeing for their phase. They can provide additional support, coordinate with other staff members, and ensure that concerns are addressed appropriately.

Please Bear With Us: Response Times

We want to be clear about our response times to help manage your expectations:

Our teachers are committed to responding to emails within 24 hours during the school week. However, please understand that:

- Teachers are busy working with children throughout the school day – their priority is always the children in their classroom
- Teachers attend important meetings including planning sessions, safeguarding meetings, training and staff training
- Emails sent after 3:30pm or at weekends may not receive a response until the next working day

We ask for your patience and understanding. Our teachers are dedicated professionals who care deeply about every child, and they will respond to your message as soon as they are able to give it their full attention.

If your concern is urgent, please:

- Call the school office on 01323482404
- Speak to a member of staff at drop-off or pick-up
- Ask to speak with a member of the senior leadership team

Why This Approach Works

- Quick Resolution Starting with the class teacher means issues can often be resolved quickly, without unnecessary delays.
- Better Understanding Class teachers have daily insight into your child's experiences, friendships and learning, which helps them address concerns effectively.
- Clear Escalation Path If additional support is needed, our Leaders of Learning can step in with a broader perspective and more resources.
- Consistent Support This structure ensures everyone is working together with the same information to support your child.

Whether your feedback is positive or relates to a concern, we want to hear from you. Your insights help us:

- Understand your child's needs better
- Celebrate successes and achievements
- Identify areas where we can improve
- Build strong partnerships between home and school

Please don't wait if you have a concern. Early communication helps us address issues before they become bigger problems.

Working Together for Happy, Successful Children

We know that when families and school staff work together, children feel supported, safe and ready to learn.

Communication is a partnership, and we're committed to:

- Listening to your concerns
- Responding promptly and professionally (within 24 hours during the school week)
- Working with you to find solutions
- Keeping you informed about your child's progress and wellbeing

EVERY MINUTE MATTERS

School Gates and Registration Times – Every Minute Matters

We wanted to remind all families about our school gate and registration times, and explain why punctuality is so important for your child's learning and wellbeing.

Our School Day Timings

Key Stage 2 (Years 3-6):

Gates close: 8:30amRegister taken: 8:30am

Key Stage 1 (Years R, 1 and 2):

Gates close: 8:40amRegister taken: 8:40am

Why Punctuality Matters

When children arrive late to school, they miss out on much more than you might think:

Missing the Start of Lessons

The beginning of each session is when teachers introduce new concepts, explain the day's learning, and set expectations. Teachers present information clearly, promote appropriate discussion, check pupils' understanding systematically, identify misunderstandings and adapt teaching as necessary to correct these. Arriving late means your child misses these crucial explanations.

Lost Learning Time

Even 5 or 10 minutes each day adds up quickly:

- 10 minutes late each day = 50 minutes of learning lost per week
- That's nearly an hour of teaching time missed every week
- Over a year, this equals weeks of lost education

Time with Friends & Peers

The start of the school day is an important time for children to:

- Settle into the classroom environment
- Chat with their friends
- Feel part of the school community
- Develop positive relationships with peers and staff

When children arrive on time, they can engage in these important social interactions that help them feel happy and secure at school.

Preparing for the School Day

Those first few minutes allow children to:

- Unpack their belongings calmly
- Organise their materials for learning
- Mentally prepare for the day ahead
- Transition from home to school in a settled way
- Follow the established routines that help them feel secure

How You Can Help

- Leave home earlier build in extra time for unexpected delays
- Prepare the night before lay out uniforms, pack bags, prepare packed lunches
- Establish a consistent morning routine children thrive on predictability
- Set alarms give yourself plenty of time, especially with the dark mornings!
- Plan your route especially if parking is difficult





E-SAFETY

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about MAKING FRIENDS ONLINE

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? In today's digital world, it's increasingly common for children to form friendships with people they've never met in person. While online connections can offer children a sense of belonging, they also carry significant risks. Around 19% of children aged 10 to 15 in England and Wales have chatted online with someone they've never met face to face. This guide offers expert advice for parents and educators on helping children navigate online friendships safely.

COMPROMISED PERSONAL SAFETY

Meeting an online 'friend' in real life risks placing a child in serious danger. From abduction to coercion, the consequences can be devastating. Reports of children being harmed after such meetings are becoming increasingly common in the UK, highlighting the peed for sefecutarities in tervention.

PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS

Online harm – such as cyberbullying, grooming or exposure to disturbing content – can lead to long-term emotional issues, including anxiety, depression and PTSD. 'Sextortion' gangs, who threaten to release sexual information about a person unless they pay them money, have reportedly targeted children as young as 11,

LONG-TERM REPERCUSSIONS

Children exposed to harmful online relationships early on may develop unhealthy beliefs about relationships, consent, or self-worth. In a recent case, a 26-year-old posed as a girl on Snapchat to befriend children aged 10 to 16, manipulating them into sexual activity and causing profound emotional distress. One 12-year-old tragically died by suicide, highlighting the long-term psychological harm online friendships with strangers can cause.

ONLINE GROOMING THREATS

Predators can use games, chat apps or social medic platforms to build relationships with children and gain their trust. This may quickly develop into grooming or exploitation. Between April 2017 and March 2023, UK police recorded nearly 34,000 online grooming offences – an 82% increase in just five years.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Children may encounter distressing or explicit material while interacting with online contacts – especially via TikTok, Instagram or Snapchat. This is evidenced in a survey by the Children's Commissioner for England, which found that 45% of children aged 8 to 17 had seen content online that made them feel upcomplications.

PRIVACY AND DATA RISKS

Children and young people often overshare personal details – such as where they live or go to school – without understanding the consequences. In fact, 4.4% of 10 to 15-year-olds in the UK have met up in real life with someone they'd only spoken to online.

Advice for Parents & Educators

TEACH SAFE ONLINE HABITS

Help children understand how to use privacy settings, protect their personal information, spot fake profiles, and report anything suspicious or concerning, like pressure tactics. Encourage them to think critically about what they share – and whom they're talking to.

KEEP CONVERSATIONS OPEN

Let children know they can talk to you about their online life. Avoid reacting with anger or judgement, as this may prevent them from opening up in the future. A child who feels listened to is more likely to disclose problems before they escalate

ENCOURAGE REAL-WORLD CONNECTIONS

Support children in building friendships through school, clubs, hobbies and activities in the real world. Strong offline relationships help reduce children's reliance on online platforms for social interaction, and can help them develop

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

rarental control settings on devices, games and apps can neip manage screen time, liter out inappropriate content, and monitor activity. While no system is perfect, they provide a valuable layer of protection as children explore digital spaces.




