ATTENDANCE

I am really concerned by the number of holiday forms that are beginning to arrive on my desk. Any absence from school has an impact.

There are 38 weeks in the year when schools are open, and 14 weeks (175 days) when families can visit family overseas; go on holiday; travel; pupils can work, take educational trips, attend non urgent medical appointments.

School holiday dates are published well in advance on the county website and all of our INSET days have been agreed for next year. As such, all parents/carers are expected wherever possible to plan and take their family holidays at this time so as not to disrupt their children's education. Education law states that parents do not have a right to take their child out of school for a holiday during term time. Only in exceptional circumstances may a headteacher grant permission for leave; and there is very strict guidance about what may or may not be approved.

Parents/carers who take their child out of school without the absence being agreed and authorised by written permission from the school can be issued with a penalty fine.

Did you know that:

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all
- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable
- poor school attendance is also closely associated with crime a quarter of school age offenders have truanted repeatedly

- at least 1 million children take at least one half day off a year without permission
- 7.5 million school days are missed each year through unauthorised absence.

GCSEs may seem a long way off for you and your child but all absence at any stage leads to gaps in your child's learning. This in turn can:

- mean that they fall behind in work
- affect their motivation
- affect their enjoyment of learning
- lead to poor behaviour
- affect their desire to attend school regularly
- affect their confidence in school
- mean they miss out on the social life of school and extra curricular opportunities and experiences
- affect their ability to have or keep friendships.

There are 365 days on the year and 190 days in the School Year.

If we take the days in school away from the days in the year we see that for 175 days children are home with their parents. If a child takes leave of absence during term time, 10 school days, attendance starts to fall to only 180 days on school. If the child is then ill for 5 more days in a year they start to be at home more than they are in school.

365 - 190 = 175

IMPORTANT DATES

Please avoid booking any time off school at all but especially during these dates.

Sadly for the last few years we have had some children missing for these key weeks and it has a real impact on the school and child. Secondary schools do use this information to inform groups and set targets. It does disadvantage children if they miss them and also stops them having a chance to show what they know!

There is no flexibility at all in the dates or days we can administer tests. They are set for us nationally and all schools complete them at the same time. Please, please do not book holidays during SATs.

The key stage 2 tests for Year 6 are timetabled from Monday 13 May to Thursday 16 May 2019.

BEAT THE STREET

We are once again taking part in this brilliant initiative.

The 'Beat the Street' will be returning to East Sussex once again this summer from 6 June to 25 July 2018. This is a fun, free walking and cycling challenge.

Last summer East Sussex was transformed into a giant walking, running and cycling game – with over 42,000 residents (including teams from over 140 schools) tapping 'Beat Boxes', collecting points for their team, and clocking up an impressive 230,927 miles – close to the distance between the Earth and the Moon!

Following the success of the game in 2017, we would like to ask for your support again this year in getting the whole school moving!

What is Beat the Street?

Beat the Street is a free, fun initiative that will see thousands of residents across East Sussex - from the major towns to rural villages and communities - take part in the countywide challenge. Close to 500 special sensors, known as Beat Boxes, will appear on lampposts across East Sussex, which people can tap with Beat the Street fobs or cards to track their journey, earning points for the distance they walk, cycle or scoot, and the chance to win prizes for themselves and their team. Players can view their progress online at beatthestreet.me/eastsussex. Find out more about how the competition works by watching this short video.

Your child will come home with a fob. These will be delivered between the 23 and 25 May, just before half term, and prior to the game starting on the 6 June 2018.

Beat the Street fobs for children will be pre-registered to your school; however you will need to encourage your child to register their fob online, should you want to be in with a chance of winning lucky taps prizes!

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LANGUAGE IN THE PLAYGROUND

Just a reminder to parents about the school's expectations.

We do have high standards of pupils' behaviour and we do expect parents to model this on the playground.

Please be mindful of the language you are using. The children may not have come out of school while you are waiting but there are younger siblings on the playground who can overhear. There should be no need to swear on school grounds at all.

Section 547 of the Education Act 1996, Persons Causing Nuisance / Disturbance on School Premises gives clear guidance: 'School premises are private property and parents have been granted permission from the school to be on school premises. However, in case of abuse or threats to staff, pupils or other parents, school may ban parents from entering school.

It is also an offence under section 547 of the Education Act 1996 for any person (including a parent) to cause a nuisance or disturbance on school premises. The police may be called to assist in removing the person concerned.

School is not then responsible for organising arrangements for children in the above circumstances. Parents will need to provide alternative arrangements for bringing children into school.'

Our expectation is that:

Adults set a good example to children at all times, showing them how to get along with all members of the school and the wider community.

Clearly choosing to use swear words is not setting a good example.

SWIMMING

If you would like your child to benefit from lessons in term 6 please ensure that if you haven't already paid that you do so before the start of Term 6.

The swimming payment has been open on ParentMail since October last year to give you the opportunity to pay over a period of time.

If you have not yet paid then your child will not have the opportunity to swim in term 6.

Thank you to all 355 parents that have contributed towards the cost of swimming.

I think it might come as a surprise to see what other schools charge.

Stone Cross who use the Lagoon in Hailsham charge £27.50 for 10 weeks of swimming

Willingdon charge £30 for 10 weeks, once a week at Ocklynge School.

All we ask for is £10 for 12 weeks and in one term children swim twice a week. Compared to other schools this is less than half! Amazing value.

We also don't have to waste valuable learning time by travelling to a pool.

Last year the Think Tank as you know felt so upset and disappointed that parents don't pay they suggested that lessons in Term 6 be focused on those parents who are really committed to their child swimming and value this experience. All children have benefitted from swimming across the school – no one has been excluded. So in term 6 those children whose parents have indicated they want them to swim and have paid will have lessons so that other children can continue with their learning in class.

This is in line with music tuition such as piano and guitar which is offered to children at a cost.

It is compulsory for one year group to swim and so we have made the decision to offer this to year 6 and so every child will continue to swim throughout term 6 in year 6.

SPORTS UPDATE

Inter-Schools Gymnastics Competition April 2018

At the beginning of this term a very talented group of gymnasts from Polegate took part in the annual Key Steps Gymnastics Competition at Hailsham Community College.

Hopes were high after last year's results – we missed out on top spot because we couldn't gain the highest marks on the vault as we hadn't been trained on a springboard.

With a new springboard purchased this year for the gym club, and with expert coaching from Zara Breeze, we were keeping everything crossed for our 2018 team that included previous members Sam, Daisy and Annabel and newcomers Hattie and Daisy.

Everybody represented the school brilliantly and I (Mrs Wallis) was extremely proud of every one of them and all the hard work they have put in this year.




Handball Festivals for Year 1 & Year 4 • Ratton School April 2018
