It has been worked out that 17 missed days of school a year can result in children achieving a grade less at the end of the year. At Secondary school, this is the difference between a D and C in Maths or at Primary, the difference between reaching the expected standard or not!

This is why we monitor it so closely at Polegate.

If your child's attendance is below 95% you will receive a termly letter informing you that this is causing us a concern.

If it drops below 92% we do invite parents in for a meeting to discuss in more depth the reasons and to explore any support we may be able to offer. Anything below 90% is classed as persistent absence and requires intervention to improve rapidly. Unless there is a serious medical condition every child should be achieving 97% at least.

If your child reaches the school target or above then they are eligible to be entered in our prize draw at the end of the year for a brand new bike!

Not only that, the children in Nursery have been busy growing all sorts of


things now it is spring- including some cress. The theme has been change. The children have seen frogspawn turn into tadpoles, soft dough into crusty bread and seeds germinate.

Last term Year 4 learnt about sound, how it travels and how they can hear things.

So Year 4 were thrilled when Liam Thompson, an Audiologist, came to speak to them about his fascinating career. It really brought their science learning to life and put it into a real life context.



At Polegate we value speaking and listening skills. Every fortnight there is a whole school debate topic and children debate and share their thoughts in class. The big debate this week was 'Should we ban cars to lower pollution'.

Should we ban cars to lower pollution?

There were lots of different opinions across the school from reception to year 6. Children were reflecting on how a ban would impact on people's individual liberty- one of our British Values.

Here's what they had to say...

"We shouldn't ban cars because if that is the only way you can get out you will be stuck."

"I think people shouldn't leave their cars running when they are still. Especially outside places like schools and hospitals."

"I think that if you ban cars it will help people stop getting bad lungs from the dirty air."

"If everyone couldn't drive the trains would be too full!"

"No! Definitely do not ban cars. I have to drive to school because my house isn't that close to school. If I had to get the bus I would have to pay. At the moment I am trying to save my money and getting the bus would be too expensive."

"I don't think there should be a complete ban, just a ban on petrol and diesel cars. I think electric cars are ok as they don't have exhaust pipes that pollute the air." "Personally, we shouldn't get rid of them all. You can't practically get a bus everywhere. Some places are remote. A complete ban wouldn't work. However electric cars are great. Initially they are more expensive but in the long run they probably work out the same price as a BMW."

SKIP2BFIT SKIP2BFIT

This term we have relaunched our Skip2Bfit challenge in school and it has caused a lot of excitement!

Each child has been given their own skipping rope for use in school and we are all aiming to skip for at least 2 minutes every day!

With the Government's guidance that all children should be physically active for at least 60 minutes every day, we are always looking for ways to include physical activity in our school day and to encourage children to continue this out of school. Skipping has proved to be one of the best ways in which we can do this.

Skipping is one of the best exercises you can do as it gives you the fundamentals of all sports i.e balance, timing and footwork.

In addition to regular skipping practise, all children are going to take part in weekly 2 minute skipping challenge, where they will record the number of skips they have completed. Each week they will aim to beat their own personal best, as well as having some friendly competition within their class. Children will be rewarded for best effort, most improvement, as well as highest number of skips achieved.

And it's not only the children who will be taking part! With staff already increasing their own fitness and trying to beat their own goals, keep a look out for some parent challenges coming soon!

In addition to the relaunch of Skip2Bfit, we have also launched our new Box2Bfit club which is run by some of our sports leaders before school on a Tuesday morning. The children have loved taking part in these new sessions and getting to use our new equipment.

I would like to thank Mrs Murphy and Mrs Wallis for organising this initiative.






WORLD BOOK DAY


