

# SEND - what does a statement mean to my child now?

# Traditionally parents have always associated a statement with an extra adult. This is no longer the case and hasn't been for a while.

I thought a feature in this newsletter to clarify the position held both nationally and by county would be useful. The SEND (Special Education Need and Disability) landscape is changing frequently and especially in recent years. An EHC Plan (Education Health Care plan) has replaced the old statement and this looks at a much more holistic approach to a child's needs and the provision needed to support the child. How a child is supported can vary from child to child. It maybe that specialist equipment or specialist services are needed, or training both in school or from external agencies is required ,targeted intervention or additional adult support is needed to meet the statutory requires of the EHCP or a combination of these.

Having an additional adult to support a child comes with its own problems as often a child can become over dependent on the adult. We therefore try to ensure for those children where full time 1-1 support is required that at least 2 different adults are employed and where targeted support is required a range of skilled staff are employed.

The SEN code of practice advocates an approach of ASSESS-PLAN-DO-REVIEW which is carried out with parents and carers to ensure that the EHCP is being implemented and that it is a 2 way process.

To put the cost into perspective the school receives top up funding for children with an EHCP and depending on the banding it ranges from£ 118.50 per month to £344 per month. As you can see it does not cover the cost of a TA working with a child. We have to subsidise costs heavily for our SEN pupils. Therefore as a school we have to be careful about how we spend this funding to ensure all aspects of the EHCP are met.

# SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

### Join this year's Summer Reading Challenge at your local library

This year we're delighted to announce that The Reading Agency Summer Reading Challenge theme is The Big Friendly Read. It will begin in libraries on Saturday 16th July and end on Saturday 10th September.

Research shows that reading for pleasure is vital for children's life chances, and that children who use libraries are twice as likely to be above average readers. The Summer Reading Challenge builds confidence and independent reading, while preventing the dip in children's literacy levels during the long break from school. It encourages them to develop the habit of reading for pleasure, one of the aims of the National Curriculum for English.

The Summer Reading Challenge is a unique partnership between The Reading Agency and public libraries across the UK and last year over 800,000 children took part.

Encourage your children to have fun with reading this summer by taking part in the annual Summer Reading Challenge at any East Sussex county public library.

The Challenge is to read six books during the summer that have been borrowed from the library and are appropriate for each child's reading ability. The Challenge is aimed at children in the four to eleven age group. If your child is not reading on his/ her own yet they can still take part by sharing their books with you or by using audio books.

To take part in this national scheme, children need to have their own library card. It is easy and free to become a

member of the library. Take something with your name, address and signature on it (a driving licence is ideal as it has all of these) to the library and you can join the whole family.

Children signing up for the challenge get a Big Friendly Read sticker. Children will be able to collect a prize for each of the six books they have read. When they finish the Challenge they will get a certificate which they can receive in school or at the library.

### What does 90% Attendance Mean?

- 90% attendance = ½ day missed every week!
- Over one school year this is 4 weeks of learning lost!
- Over the 5 years at your secondary school you will have missed half a year!
- What impact might this have on your child's future ...?
- 17 missed schools days means that in secondary school they could drop a whole GCSE grade.
- 8 days absence = 96%.
- 19 days absence = 90%
