#### **INTERIM REPORTS**

You will remember that after some discussion we decided that there were an excessive amount of reports being sent home and that each one didn't give any additional information that you didn't already know.

The Think Tank felt that it was not necessary to receive a report every term about their child. We discussed this at length because I am really keen that you, as parents, receive as much information as possible about your children and their progress. The Think Tank reassured me that they felt well informed through parent consultations in Term 2 and the Interim Report only repeated what they found out in the meeting.

I also know that if we are concerned about a child we do not wait until it is time to send out an interim report to tell you this. So this term only your child completed the Interim Report themselves as they normally do and this is powerful because it allows them to reflect on their learning and behaviour and take ownership of it.

You will however receive the very detailed Interim Report at the start of term 2 which indicates attainment.

We will review this and as you know are very happy to listen to your views on these changes.

Nationally there is a big agenda to reduce the workload of teachers and I fully support this. Teachers in school work exceptionally hard for your children. Often starting at 7.30am and staying well beyond the time children go home. I have a duty to make sure that the tasks they are carrying out are necessary and worthwhile. I am sure you will agree that the most important use of their time is planning exciting learning to ensure your children make accelerated progress so we have taken this step to ensure we facilitate this.





### **TRAFFIC**


The Aviva Community Fund offers you the chance to get funding for causes important to your community.

#### So far we have 878 votes but we need lots more! Every person gets 10 votes.

The project includes further development to the wildlife garden so that is more accessible to the children. It includes an outdoor classroom in the environment so that the space becomes even more flexible and practical. Plans have been drawn up but we are still in discussion about these so it is likely they will develop further.

We are also building an Anderson Shelter to bring history to life in this same area. We have secured funds for this and we have builders ready to go but this is on hold until they can gain access through the current building work!



# SCHOOL TRIPS & VISITS

#### Sadly we came very close to cancelling several recent school trips.

### This was the Year 4 Lion King trip.

The efforts we made to ensure we explored every last option before cancelling took up a huge amount of our time unnecessarily and this was frustrating: calling parents; sending texts; writing letters and liaising with coach companies and the theatre itself. Please can I ask all parents to reply by the deadlines we set. As the school is growing, we now have over 700 pupils if you include nursery, it is unsustainable for us to keep issuing reminders as we have done or chasing parents up- it wastes a huge amount of time and generates lots of extra work.

As a result of the time it took to get a response from parents we then lost our original booking and had to start all over again with the coach company and theatre in order to get a new date!

Thankfully this means that the trip will go ahead and our incredible children do not miss out on such a marvellous opportunity so it was worth it in the end. There will come a time however when regrettably I have to make a decision without extending deadlines.

Many parents were so frustrated when we were close to cancelling and spoke to me and I share these frustrations completely. The common request is, 'Can't the trip go ahead without the children whose parents haven't paid?' The answer is, 'No' because we have to follow the **Department for Education policy**May 2018 when organising school trips.

I thought you might be interested to read the clear advice they give schools.

#### **Voluntary contributions**

Nothing in legislation prevents a school governing body or local authority from asking for voluntary contributions for the benefit of the school or any school activities.

However, if the activity cannot be funded without voluntary contributions, the governing body or head teacher should make this clear to parents at the outset. The governing body or head teacher must also make it clear to parents that there is no obligation to make any contribution.

It is important to note that no child should be excluded from an activity simply because his or her parents are unwilling or unable to pay. If insufficient voluntary contributions are raised to fund a visit, or the school cannot fund it from some other source, then it must be cancelled. Schools must ensure that they make this clear to parents. If a parent is unwilling or unable to pay, their child must still be given an equal chance to go on the visit. Schools should make it clear to parents at the outset. what their policy for allocating places on school visits will be.

# The school has sent letters out to parents asking for contributions towards a school visit, do parents have to pay?

A. Head teachers or governing bodies may ask parents for voluntary contributions towards the cost of:

- any activity which takes place during school hours;
- school equipment; and
- school funds generally.

Children of parents who are unable, or unwilling, to contribute may not be discriminated against. However, if insufficient voluntary contributions are received to cover the cost of the visit, or activity, and there is no alternative method to make up the shortfall, then the school should cancel the activity/visit.

It would be advisable to make parents aware of a possible cancellation to the activity/visit if insufficient voluntary contributions are received from the outset.



# YEAR 5 VICTORIAN DAY SPARE THE ROD AND SPOIL THE CHILD

### Did you know this saying originated in Victorian times?

You might think it means that people didn't want to hit children and preferred to give them treats. However most adults of the time believed that a good whack with the rod (or cane) would help children become more resilient. If they didn't receive the rod (cane) as punishment then they would likely end up spoilt and rotten!


#### Another proverb from the Victorian times was children should be seen and not heard

# CHARITY FUNDRAISING


**Bethany Sharma and her** cousin (Chloe) sadly lost their Grandad in a motorbike accident in the summer holidays.
