HINDLEAP WARREN


Children return braver, stronger, more independent and muddier!

The wonderful staff at the centre encouraged us every step of the way. We have come back changed 'we are braver, stronger, more independent and more confident. We were also a lot muddier'.



MYTH BUSTER OUR SWIMMING POOL

It is that really exciting time of the year and the children are LOVING swimming!

We believe that every child should have the chance to learn to swim at primary school.

Swimming is a statutory part of the national curriculum, just like Maths and English, yet over 1,300 primary schools in England don't provide any swimming lessons at all.

Some parent comments have reached me about the voluntary contribution and it has been a while since I have shared the facts.

Some parents believe the school HAVE to provide swimming

Yes, all schools must provide swimming instruction either in key stage 1 or key stage 2 but this can be for a very limited period and restricted to only one year group. We do not have to provide swimming to all year groups.

Government guidelines state:

'Pupils should be taught to:

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke]
- perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.

You will notice it does not specify both key stages. Most schools will only provide it for one year group and even then only for a term which really limits the opportunity for the children at the school. They also charge for the travel and swimming'

There have been some comments made to other parents and Kerry that it is expensive!

I think it might come as a surprise to see what other schools charge.

- Stone Cross who use the Lagoon in Hailsham charge £27.50 for 10 weeks of swimming
- Willingdon charge £30 for 10 weeks, once a week at Ocklynge School.

These were fees in 2018, they may even be more now.

All we ask for is £12 for 12 weeks and in one term children swim twice a week. Compared to other schools this is less than half! Amazing value.

The school should pay for itthey get the money in the school budget.

We get no money towards the pool in our school budget. Budgets have been hit hard in recent years and in real terms we have less money than we once did. We do however subsidise the cost of the pool with our Sports Premium Funding quite heavily because we think swimming is such an important life skill.

It is important to bear in mind that any money we spend on the swimming pool is money that is taken from somewhere else in the school.

This is the reason why over the years that many schools have taken the decision to shut their school pools.

If you would like your child to benefit from lessons in term 6 please ensure that if you haven't already paid that you do so before the start of Term 6.

The swimming payment has been open on ParentMail since October last year to give you the opportunity to pay over a period of time.

If you have not yet paid then your child will not have the opportunity to swim in term 6.

Thank you to the 428 parents that have contributed towards the cost of swimming. This does mean we can keep our pool.

We also don't have to waste valuable learning time by travelling to a pool.



ATTENDANCE

There are 365 days in the year and 190 days in the school year.

If we take the days in school away from the days in the year we see that for 175 days children are at home with their parents.

If a child takes leave of absence during term time, 10 school days, attendance starts to fall to only 180 days in school. If the child is then ill for 5 or more days ina year, they start to be at home more than they are in school.

365 - 190 = 175

The whole school is currently at: 96.8%

With the Big Pedal over, we thought you might be interested to hear abut this year's superb achievements.

This year's Big Pedal saw more than 1,682 schools and over 559,000 pupils taking part in the challenge. By cycling, walking or scooting to school pupils travelled the equivalent of 11.9 million miles – that's 50 trips to the moon, or 480 trips around the world.

In total, a record 2.3 million pupil journeys and close to 1.5 million supporter journeys (parents, siblings and teachers) were made by bike, foot or scooter.
