NEW TIMES TABLE TEST

All children will be tested on their times tables as part of their KS2 Sats, under new plans unveiled by the education secretary Nicky Morgan.

The tests will examine multiplication skills in every 11-year-old.

Pupils will expected to know all tables up to 12x12, with the skill measured using an "on-screen check" examination. This is going to be introduced in 2017 so our current year 5 pupils will sit this new test.

A small number of schools will pilot the test this year, we wait and see if we will be asked!

As always controversy surrounds this decision and there are different educational viewpoints:

Professor Boaler believes: "It is not terrible to remember maths facts; what is terrible is sending kids away to memorise them and giving them tests on them which will set up this maths anxiety."

She added that although some children were fine with

timed tests, others were not. But she said the message of timed tests was that being able to memorise things quickly was the same thing as being good at maths.

"Governments saying everybody has to memorise their times tables to 12x12 is absolutely disastrous," she added.

But Ms Morgan insisted the tests were right for pupils. "They will help teachers recognise those at risk of falling behind and allow us to target those areas where children aren't being given a fair shot to succeed."

The new tests will see children complete multiplication challenges against the clock, which will be scored instantly, with the DfE saying it is the first use of on-screen technology in National Curriculum tests.

At Polegate we are already working hard at supporting pupils to develop a good understanding of their tables through a variety of methods such as our maths passport and so we hope by the time our pupils reach the end of year 4 they will know their times tables up to 12 well.

Once again any help you provide at home will only help your child succeed.

School league tables show rising standards

Bourne primary shows major improvement

The majority of primary schools in the area have met or beaten Government expectations in reading, writing and maths.

The final league tables of 2015 for Key Stage 2 were published on Thursday (December 10) and East Sussex as a local authority matched the national average for the second year running.

The results mean 80 per cent of 10/11-year-olds in the county achieved the expected level of competence or higher in the three Rs.

Most Eastbourne schools saw an improvement from last year, with Bourne showing the biggest improvement with a leap from 46 per cent to 62 per cent.

John Maxwell, Headteach-

er of Bourne Primary school said, "We are very pleased with the results. They are part of the picture of rapid improvement across Bourne School, and they reflect the outstanding progress that the vast majority of pupils made last year.

"There is still more work to be done, and further improvements to be made but these results reflect the fantastic work which is being done by the children, staff, parents, governors and East Sussex County Council."

While Bourne saw major improvements, several other schools in the area have slipped back and recorded lower figures than in 2014: Heron Park dropped one percentage point from 50 to 49, Shinewater fell from 70 to 67, Stafford dropped from 88 to 81 and West Rise dipped from 88 to 88.

Alfriston School recorded the top figure in the area with 93 per cent. Following closely behind is Polegate with 92 per cent, then the Haven School and Pevensey and Westham with 90 per cent each.

Alfriston head Lindsey Hudson said, "Everyone at Alfriston School is absolutely delighted by this year's results that reflect the hard work in and out of the classroom.

"I would like to pay tribute to all the pupils, parents and carers, staff and governors at the school in bringing about this achievement."

Other schools in the area also showed improvement: Hankham saw 74 per cent of youngsters make the grade, 77 for Langney, 70 for Oakwood, 78 for Ocklynge, 78 for Parkland, 87 for St Thomas a Becket, 83 for Stone Cross, 89 for Tollgate and 87 for Willingdon.

Since 2012, when East Sussex failed to reach the national average – then 75 per cent – the authority has logged a nine per cent improvement.

92% of our pupils achieved a Level 4 in English and Maths. This actually places us in the top 10% of schools nationally and for progress we fall into the top 1%! This was quite an achievement. Well done everyone!



HEALTHY EATING

This is the time when we all make new year resolutions and it also appears to be the time when our County Council and government want us to consider the foods our children eat.

The amount of sugar that our children are eating is always in the news at the moment with some very high profile people (Jamie Oliver and David Gandy) supporting the reduction of sugar children are eating.

Latest data collected as part of the National Child Measurement Programme shows that in 2014/15, one in five (19.9%) reception year children in East Sussex were classified as carrying excess weight, with this rising to almost one in three (29.6%) by the time pupils reach year 6. Schools play a key role in encouraging and providing

opportunities for children and young people to learn about food and to eat a healthy diet as part of a whole school approach. Resources have recently been published (or are soon to be released) and are designed to support schools in teaching about healthy eating.

Look out for Change4Life's new healthy eating campaign due to launch in January 2016. Focusing on the new sugar guidelines, the campaign will provide families with the knowledge and tools they need to help them cut down on sugar. This will include a new app to help parents to visualise the sugar lurking in foods, with sugar content brought to life on the screen with a visual of sugar cubes. Further resources, including recipes and ideas for healthy swaps, will be available online to help parents take control of the sugar in their child's diet.



We have a duty to promote healthy eating and this is why we have a policy that sweets and chocolate are not allowed at any time- even if included as part of a packed lunch. It is often difficult to distinguish sweets from cake bars, biscuits etc. To clarify anything found in the sweet aisle is not allowed. It is important to note that whilst we would not encourage it anything found in the cake or biscuit aisle would be permitted. Fizzy drinks are not permitted and this includes sparkling water. If prohibited items are continued to be brought in to school we will remove these for the duration of the time in school and returned to the child at the end of the school day. All staff will continue to follow this policy.

The children all had a wonderful time and as always behaved superbly. I had the pleasure of joining them and enjoyed every second!





- Please help your child to be punctual


