Trial of new parent consultation evenings in class 5B

It was such a privilege to be involved in the Year 5 parent consultation evenings. I sat in on every one in class 5B as we trialled a new approach.

For me, it was a huge success. The difference was the child spoke about their own learning; their strengths, successes, areas of challenge, targets, favourite subjects. Each and every presentation was different and so personal to the child.

I think it was special for many reasons but for me, most importantly it was child led. The children were taking ownership of their own learning. They spoke with confidence, maturity and a great deal of passion. It was quite a daunting experience for them. They stood up and spoke to their parents, teacher and me! It only proved too much for two pupils and then the teacher read their presentation.

Following and during presentations the teacher and parents asked questions and of course there was the opportunity at the end to talk without the child. The children left beaming and we all felt proud.

I gained such a valuable insight into each child and their perception of school. Many spoke about how much they love French and the approach used to teach it, a credit to Mrs Williams, our French speaking teaching assistant.

It was clear to see the impact the introduction of the pen licence has had on pupils' attitude to their handwriting. This was mentioned on every presentation! They are showing determination and persistence because they want to earn it. This can only be a good thing. We invited the parents and pupils to comment on this new approach and collected in questionnaires and feedback. This is what they said:

"more about the child as an individual and not all target driven."

"fun and informative."

The benefits parents identified were: confidence building, child taking an active role in their own learning, supports presentation skills, opportunity for pupils to identify their own strengths and weaknesses.

In February at the next parent consultation we will now use this approach for all year 5 and year 6 classes.

Apart from the few inevitable ICT issues I felt that this approach was a huge success.

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NURSERY NEWS

We are so excited about having the opportunity to establish a nursery as part of Polegate School. This nursery is independent of any other in the area and is to be lead and managed by Polegate School.

It has been brought to our attention that there is some confusion in the community related to the management of the new nursery. Whilst the nursery is yet to open its doors to our very first 2 year olds we have very clear aims and aspirations.

Once again an extremely pleasant Parents Evening this being the sixth year!


The children's work around the school is astounding!! I felt it reflected a rather impressive Arts/Crafts Gallery.


