# WILLINGDON COMMUNITY SCHOOL

Our Year 5's benefited from enrichment provided at Willingdon School.

A Science challenge morning. They had to test out how good washing up liquids were. Then later in the week they joined Willingdon again for a sports event which they really enjoyed.

## **RESULTS**

These are hot off the press as we only received them back in last week and so they are provisional.

Our year 2 pupils gained their highest ever results and our year 6 once again did exceptionally well. Just take a look at the number of pupils reaching the highest levels of greater depth! This really does show that our mixed ability approach to teaching pupils meets the needs of our most able! These results place us in at least the top 20% of schools in the country and in some subjects the top 5%.

These results show year on year improvements. The exception to this is reading at expected level, which although broadly in line with national

and our last year's result does not show the same increase as other subjects or greater depth in reading. What we do know is the children that read on a regular basis at home and have done over many years all achieved expected and most better than that!

All the standards have got higher and it is no longer enough to send children to school and not support learning at home. If children are to reach the standards required it has to be a partnership and these results are a reflection of the brilliant partnership we have with parents. I would like to congratulate the children on these incredible results and thank them for their hard work and really conscientious attitude to learning.

# READING CHALLENGE

#### Join this year's Summer Reading Challenge at your local library

This year we're delighted to announce that The Reading Agency Summer Reading Challenge theme is Animal Agents. It will begin in libraries on Saturday 15th July and end on Saturday 9th September.

Research shows that reading for pleasure is vital for children's life chances, and that children who use libraries are twice as likely to be above average readers. The Summer Reading Challenge builds confidence and independent reading, while preventing the dip in children's literacy levels during the long break from school. It encourages them to develop the habit of reading for pleasure, one of the aims of the National Curriculum for English.

Encourage your children to have fun with reading this summer by taking part in the annual Summer Reading Challenge at any East Sussex county public library.

The Challenge is to read six books during the summer that have been borrowed from the library and are appropriate for each child's reading ability. The Challenge is aimed at children in the four to eleven age group. If your child is not reading on his/ her own yet they can still take part by sharing their books with you or by using audio books.

To take part in this national scheme, children need to have their own library card. It is easy and free to become a member of the library. Take something with your name, address and signature on it (a driving licence is ideal as it has all of these) to the library and you can join the whole family.



Children signing up for the Challenge get an animal Agents sticker. Children will be able to collect a prize for each of the six books they have read. When they finish the Challenge they will get a certificate which they can receive in school or at the library.


## EASTBOURNE COLLEGE ACADEMIC CHALLENGE DAY

# **School Attendance**

#### Attendance is such a high priority for schools at the moment, especially schools in East Sussex.

We have much higher absence rates that other authorities and so you will see a big campaign which starts in September to promote good attendance.

We will be continuing to focus on attendance because we know what a disadvantage pupils face when they are not in school.

For example: Pupils with

attendance below 90% are far less likely to be able to read well. In fact only 17% of children in year 3 that had poor attendance are fluent readers. If vou compare this to 64% of children with attendance above 90% the reality is stark as the graph shows.


## **Class figures**

The whole school average is 96% a drop from last term when we were hitting the target. Our target is 97% and we are so nearly there-keep going!

I will do all I can to ensure that children succeed and so I am prepared to challenge parents when children are not in school. This is because your children come first and we care!

#### So what about children at Poleaate?


In our own school we really do see a difference! I have just analysed our year 6 results and the children that were most likely to achieve expected level in reading, writing and maths were those with attendance above 95%.

Children that had poor attendance below 95% had far less chance of reaching expected in reading, writing and maths. At Polegate only 48% of these children reached expected

Compare this with children that were in school learning for at least 95% and their chances of success increase to 65%.

#### Pupils achieving Reading, writing and maths in 2017 at Poleaate based on attendance

This is why we will have conversations very early in term 1 when children are not at school.
