Which pupil would you expect to have a better vocabulary?
Which pupil would you expect to be more successful in school?
...and in life?

What about a pupil that doesn't read regularly at home or perhaps not at all? What are their chances of success?

This is why, at Polegate, we place so much importance on reading at home. All research and studies show that children who read every day do better at every stage of their education. We see it in school; the pupils that read at home are making better progress.

We are very fortunate at Polegate school to have so many supportive families that promote regular reading and learning at home and this reflects in the results our pupils achieve.

I would like to say a huge thank you to you all. I have seen in home school journals that you do all read regularly with your children and record this in the books. Through reading children gain a rich vocabulary and this is so important as the research shows. We want to give

our pupils power and confidence and words give them both.

ATTENDANCE

The whole school attendance is currently 97.25% which is brilliant to see!

Please keep this up because I have set an ambitious target this year for the whole school of 97.5%.

Our focus over the last few years has been on increasing the attendance for our vulnerable groups. Our Free School Meal pupils traditionally have a much lower attendance that the whole school. This correlates with how well they do. It is no surprise to know that children who miss school do not do as well or make as much progress.

Already a gap is showing for some of our focus groups:

FSM	94.05%
NON-FSM	97.64%

The second group that do not attend school as frequently as others is our pupils with special educational needs. They already face barriers with their learning and so to miss more school only compounds this problem.

The whole school is currently at: 97.25%

You can see in the chart below the reasons why children have taken time off school already. It is quite shocking to see that after a 6 week holiday some families have already made the decision to take their children out of school for yet another holiday! I wonder what parents would say if teachers decided to do the same?

Termly prize for the class with the highest attendance. This is to recognise a team effort regarding attendance. Classes chose the reward for themselves and in the past they have chosen: roller skate disco, cinema, Forest School to name just a few!

Termly prize for individual children that have had 100% for that term. There are lots of goodies such as notepads, mini torches, highlighters, mini pencil cases and a certificate. If a child doesn't win a prize one term then they have a chance the following term. The children love this incentive.

Each week we celebrate the classes with the highest attendance and they get a certificate to proudly display in class.

BIG ATTENDANCE PRIZE

At the end of the year there is the **BIG ATTENDANCE PRIZE** which recognises EVERY child that has reached our school target 97.5% or more with a prize draw. Every child that reaches this is entered into a draw to win a brand new bike of their choice!

This keeps the incentive to reach the target throughout the year.

Please note that if your child has attended a hospital consultation their official attendance is affected, they will miss a session if they are not in school for morning registration or afternoon we recognise this is unavoidable and in these circumstances and provided parents pop in and tell Kerry the child will still be eligible for the incentives. Due to the size of our school we do rely on parents to remind Kerry just before the last week because our computer system will not separate attendance in this way when we generate the reports we need.

That said, I am thoroughly looking forward to joining the Polegate team next term, hoping to put something of a Sutton spin on things in Year 5.



The competition that ran throughout the summer was a big success.



E-SAFETY TIPS



Keeping your child safe online - A checklist for parents and carers

As a parent you'll probably know how important the internet is to children and young people. They use it to learn, play, socialise and express themselves in all types of creative ways. This may be through sharing photos and videos, blogging, gaming, or even developing their own apps. It is a place of amazing opportunities.

The technology children use in their daily lives can seem daunting. You might worry about the risks they can face online, such as bullying, contact from strangers, as well as the possibility of access to inappropriate or illegal content. To help them stay safe, it's important that you understand how your child uses the internet.

By following this simple checklist, you can start to protect them and decrease the risks they face:



I have asked my child to show me sites they use – By doing so, your child is including you in their online life and social activity. Show an interest and take note of the names of their favourite sites. You can then re-visit these when you are alone. Take your time and explore the space, find out how to set the safety features and learn how to report any issues directly to the site.



I have asked my child to set their profile settings to private – Social networking sites, such as Facebook, are used by children to share information, photos and just about everything they do! Encourage your child to set their privacy settings to private. They need to think about the information they post online as it could be copied and pasted anywhere, without their permission. If it got into the wrong hands, somebody may wish to use it against them or worst of all try to locate them in the real world.



I have asked my child about their online friends — We know that people lie online about who they are and may create fake identities. It is very important children understand this. Whether they are visiting a social network or a gaming site, the safety messages are the same. Children and young people must never give out personal information and only be "friends" with people they know and trust in the real world.



I have set appropriate parental controls on my child's computer, mobile and games console — Filters on computers and mobiles can prevent your child from viewing inappropriate and possibly illegal content. You can activate and change levels depending on your child's age and abilities. You can also set time restrictions for using the internet or games. They can be free and easy to install. Call your service provider who will be happy to assist or visit CEOP's parents' site for further information. Explain to your child why you are setting parental controls when you talk to them about their internet use.



My child has agreed to tell me if they are worried about something online – Sometimes children get into situations online where they don't feel comfortable or see something they don't want to see. By opening up the communication channels and talking to your child about the internet, their favourite sites and the risks they may encounter, they are more likely to turn to you if they are concerned about something.



I know where to get help if I'm concerned about my child – The CEOP Safety Centre provides access to a range of services. If you are concerned that an adult has made inappropriate contact with your child you can report this directly to CEOP. You can also find help if you think your child is being bullied, or if you've come across something on the internet which you think may be illegal.


