


WELCOME BACK

Primary school is awarded prestigious 'flagship' status

Polegate School is now the only school in East Sussex to have achieved the prestigious status of a Flagship School.

The primary school is one of around 100 schools in the country to be given the award which recognises schools which have held Centre of Excellence status for three years or more.

Headteacher Claire Martin-O'Donoghue said, "Ensuring every one of our pupils achieves their full potential is at the heart of everything we do at Polegate school.

Polegate School was assessed in July this year by

Assessor Anita Watts said, "The children at Polegate are the school's greatest ambassadors. "The school has an excit buzz and vibrancy and pupils quite simply love th school.

WILLINGDON EXPANSION



It looks as though we are not the only school expanding. A consultation has gone out regarding expanding Willingdon Community School.

Please have your say and complete the short survey, especially as many of our pupils move on to Willingdon.

East Sussex County Council (ESCC) would like to expand Willingdon Community School to provide more places for local children and young people. Demand for school places in the area the school serves has increased in recent years, and is likely to continue, as a result of new housing developments. ESCC has a statutory duty to ensure there are enough school places and is therefore proposing to expand Willingdon Community School to create additional capacity.

If the proposal goes ahead the school would grow from 1000 places to 1200 places, increasing the published admission number from 200 to 240 with effect from 1st September 2020.



Additional accommodation would be provided to enable the school to expand.

A four week consultation on the proposal will begin on Friday 8th September and run until Friday th October. The consultation will go ive on the ESCC website on 8th September and can be views by the following link below. I would encourage yoy to give your views on the proposal

PARKING FINES BY POST

East Sussex will be issuing fines to parents that drop off on the zig zags

Drivers who park on keep clear markings outside schools can now expect to get an unwelcome letter in the post.

Penalty charge notices issued by East Sussex County Council's civil enforcement officers (CEOs) will be sent to drivers by post if they drive off before they can be issued in person or attached to vehicles.

The move, which coincides with the start of the new school year, is aimed at drivers who park on zig-zag lines or 'keep clear' markings outside schools.

The council says the change will allow officers to work more efficiently and should provide more of a deterrent to stop people from parking in areas with these restrictions, which are there to improve safety for schoolchildren and other pedestrians.

The new system will apply in the boroughs of Eastbourne and Hastings and in Lewes district – the areas of the county where the council is responsible for parking enforcement.

Karl Taylor, county council assistant director for operations, said: "We know from the feedback we get from the public that parking outside schools is a big issue.

"The roads outside many schools are very busy at the start and end of the school day, meaning some parents may be tempted to stop in places where they wouldn't usually park.

"The 'keep clear' markings are there for a reason – to ensure the safety of children and other pedestrians – and parking in these areas is anti-social and dangerous.

"The switch to posting out penalty charge notices will allow our CEOs to cover more ground and help to keep our roads and our young people safe."

The changes were agreed at the council's transport and environment lead member meeting in March. Errant drivers are fined £70, reduced to £35 if paid within 14 days.



SWIMMING

We have not increased the cost of swimming to parents in the 6 years!

Pool costs have increased however in this time. So £10 is very little in relation to the cost and work attached to keeping the pool - it amounts to 50p a lesson!

You can pay this now through Parentpay either in full or in instalments across the year. If you have paid your child has opportunity to swim in both term 5 and 6.

STRONG & DETERMINED LEADERSHIP

Polegate School continues to be a highly successful school. Its attention to detail in relation to inclusive practice, ensures that the hard working and dedicated staff strive to support the children to achieve their best.

The Head teacher puts high standards and expectations at the heart of her vision for the school, and is supported in this aim, by an effective, experienced and knowledgeable leadership team. The staff are inspired to give their best, as the Head teacher shows strong and determined leadership.

A High Proportion of Outstanding Teaching

The quality of teaching is never less than good, with a high proportion of outstanding teaching. The leadership team, are extremely knowledgeable about the individual stages of development of staff, and coach and mentor accordingly. Excellent professional relationships are prevalent, with an ethos of trust and appreciation. This is further enhanced by high levels of dialogue, which take place formally and informally.

Disseminating Excellent Practice

Staff reach out to other schools and there are many and varied examples of them disseminating their excellent practice. They also exhibit a desire to continually learn themselves, both within the school and outside it. Classroom practice is regularly analysed and dissected, and the school has a reflective and selfevaluative ethos. The Head teacher has emphasised that she too values the learning process, and she has embarked upon additional training for herself, for the benefit of Polegate School. Hence, she recently took the opportunity to train as an Ofsted Inspector, which gave her additional knowledge and understanding in relation to their criteria.

Regular Pupil Progress

Meetings

Regular pupil progress meetings take place and there is detailed analysis which leads to the identification of any child who needs additional support to make the expected progress. The Leadership Team monitor the children's workbooks, observe lessons and track data that they can continually evaluate. Governors are also involved in the monitoring and evaluation, and in this respect, ask challenging questions to check that the actions taken have made a difference.

Outstanding Displays

Displays within the school are truly outstanding. They are an accurate indicator of the high standards the school adopts and a barometer of the expectations that the Head teacher, leadership team and other staff have for the children. Colourful, imaginative and informative displays therefore, combine both the celebration and exemplification of learning. There are high levels of artistic skills within the staff team, which further contribute to the quality of displays. The environment seeks to include all the children, in its aim of motivating their interests.

An Excited Buzz and Vibrancy

The children are Polegate School's greatest ambassadors. The school has an excited buzz and vibrancy. They quite simply love their school and are articulate in their descriptions of all the school has to offer. Children feel very well supported in their progress and have enormous faith in the staff. They can clearly explain how the teaching team help them in their learning and make the lessons enjoyable. Their behaviour is excellent. In class, they are focused and hardworking, showing interest and enthusiasm. The lessons are creative and made fun by very talented staff.

Parents are Valued

Parents are a valued part of the school team, and are highly respected by the staff. The school has gone to great lengths to be welcoming and to value all members of the community and different family circumstances. It is incredibly hard to recruit exceptional teachers currently (the news tells us that no one wants to do the job) and when they are subjected to abuse, Facebook comments, rudeness I will struggle to keep our outstanding teachers who go above and beyond.

Model to your children the behaviour we expect from them and consider how you would like to be spoken to by us.

It is great when we hear about the achievements of past pupils and I always love sharing this with the school community. These past pupils demonstrate how you can achieve your hopes and aspirations with a lot of hard work and determination. It also makes me feel so proud. In September 2003, I had my first day at Polegate primary school. Now, 14 years later, I am preparing to move to Edinburgh to begin my life at university, studying for a degree in Veterinary medicine.

The chances of getting a place to study veterinary medicine first time are about 1 in 10. So out of the six-other people that were in the interview room with me in Edinburgh, either one or none of us were going to get a place. And I managed to get in!

It just goes to show however much you might think that something is never going to happen, or that the work you're doing is too difficult, or that you can't do something, if you persevere and always try your best, then anything can happen and nothing is impossible.

LIBRARY


We have just heard today that there may be a possibility that Polegate Library will be closing. The children are outraged as we are. We are planning a big campaign – more details will follow.

SCHOOL FAMILY SUPPORT ADVISOR

Amanda Nippard is the school's Family Support Advisor. She will be in school on Thursdays and she will be available in the School playground in the morning's if you have anything you would like to discuss with her, catch her then or contact the school office. She will be running drop in coffee mornings on 21.9.17, 5.10.17, 19.10.17 so please pop along to meet her and some other parents. She will work directly with children in school running nurture sessions and supporting pupils with their well being. Amanda has another very important role and that is supporting parents with attendance. She will be monitoring attendance across the school on a weekly basis. The focus is on pupils with historically very low attendance over a number of years.

Good Attendance Means...

Being in school at least 98% of the time or 186 to 190 days That's no more than 4 days off a year



Nationally it is expected that children are in school at least 98% of the year. We are so nearly there!

Thank you for your on-going support with this. When we talk to parents about attendance please remember it is only because we care! Sadly county and schools only have to take a firm stance on attendance because some families and these are a small minority abuse the system, lie and keep their children off school resulting in low attendance year after year. We can't ignore this! We are failing children if we do because their life chances are being affected and if that means we have difficult conversations with parents then that is what we have a duty to do. Believe me I would rather not!


