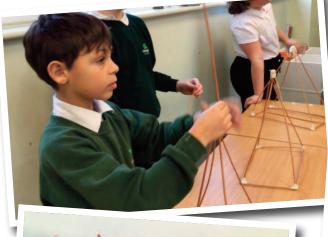

COVID UPDATE

As you know the government guidance has changed on 21 February, the Prime Minister set out the next phase of the government's COVID-19 response.

COVID-19 continues to be a virus that we learn to live with and the imperative to reduce the disruption to children and young people's education remains.

Our priority is for schools, colleges, childminders and nurseries to deliver face-to-face, high-quality education and care to all children and young people. The evidence is clear that being out of education causes significant harm to educational attainment, life chances, as well as mental and physical health.

The main messages are:

- Face coverings are no longer advised for pupils, staff and visitors in classrooms and communal areas.
- Contacts are no longer required to self-isolate or advised to take daily tests, and contact tracing has ended.
- Children and young people previously considered CEV should attend school and should follow the same COVID-19 guidance as the rest of the population

The setting remains open and your child should continue to attend as normal. All students and staff, regardless of year group, should remain vigilant regarding COVID-19.

What to do if your child develops symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) or tests positive for COVID-19. Advice is still to isolate, see below for details.

The main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are a new, continuous cough, or a high temperature, or a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10-day period of self-isolation.

For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

If your child does develop symptoms, you can seek advice from the nhs.uk website at

https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coron avirus-covid-19/check-if-you-have-coronavirus-symptoms/. If you are concerned about your child's symptoms, or they are worsening you can seek advice from NHS 111 at https://111.nhs.uk/ or by phoning 111.

We continue to promote all the measures to prevent the spread in school.

How to stop coronavirus (COVID-19) spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with coronavirus (COVID-19): guidance on how to stay safe and help prevent the spread

- get vaccinated everyone aged 18 and over can book COVID-19 vaccination appointments now.
 Those aged 16 and 17 will be invited to book an appointment: Who can get the coronavirus (COVID-19) vaccine NHS (www.nhs.uk). Those who are aged 12-15 who are themselves clinically extremely vulnerable or live with someone who is clinically extremely vulnerable or meet JCVI recommendations (JCVI statement) are also eligible.
- wash your hands with soap and water or use hand sanitiser regularly throughout the day
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze
- put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
- meet people outside and avoid crowded areas
- open doors and windows to let in fresh air if meeting people inside
- wear a face covering when it's hard to stay away from other people – particularly indoors or in crowded places

ATTENDANCE

THERE HAVE BEEN STRONG STATEMENTS FROM THE GOVERNMENT ABOUT 'BUSINESS AS USUAL' FOR SCHOOLS.

Attendance is once again at the forefront of their minds. Children have missed out on so much over recent years and there is now a real determination to ensure all children are in school as much as possible.

Our school Attendance Officer is Natalie Dicker.

Attendance: The legal duties placed on schools.

All schools have a legal duty to monitor student attendance daily and to inform the local authority of any student who is regularly absent from school

They must also investigate any unexplained absences as part of their legal safeguarding duty.

Schools should

Promote good attendance and reduce absence, including persistent absence ensure every learner has access to full-time education to which they are entitled act early to address patterns of absence

I want to explain the process we follow for all children whose attendance falls below 90%, this classes as persistent absence nationally and it is very rare for children to fall into this category without serious medical conditions which can be supported by medical evidence.

Here at Polegate, each term the Attendance Officer runs an attendance report for every pupil across the school - these are sent home so that parents/carers are aware what their child's attendance levels are.

We have a statutory obligation to then assess any child whose attendance falls below 90% and the reasons for absence. If we have not been provided with medical evidence to explain the absences, then we have a

duty to inform individual families who will then be invited in for a meeting to discuss these. We need to ascertain if there are any underlying issues we are unaware of and to see how we can support attendance.

We know that there can be many reasons for low attendance, and these can be complex. When we know the reasons, we can work with families to put together an effective support plan.

Meetings are held at the School by a member of staff from Education, Support, Behaviour & Attendance Service (ESBAS), Mrs Martin-O'Donoghue and the School Attendance Officer.

The outcome of these meetings will result in the following for a 10-week period:

In order to be approved any further absences MUST be supported by medical evidence - an appointment card/letter, a prescription. Without supporting evidence, the absence will be unauthorised.

If there are 10 sessions of unauthorised absences (5 school days) within this period, families will be referred to legal services with a potential penalty notice to be issued.

A penalty notice is a fine for parents or carers who don't ensure that their child goes to school. The fine is £120 per parent per child. If you pay within 21 days this is reduced to £60 per parent per child. We do not expect to get to this point with any of our families and the reason for meetings is to avoid this happening.

How you can help:

- If you have any difficulties getting your child to school, then please call us to discuss this. You do not need to wait until we invite you in for a meeting.
- Always provide a specific reason for

- absence this helps accurate recording and avoids unnecessary phone calls home. Without this information any absence will be recorded as unauthorised. If you have medical evidence, please provide it. We keep it on file and it ensures we are fully up to date with your child's health- it may be we decide they require a health care plan.
- Please always report via the absence telephone line or by parent mail. Please avoid passing absence information on to a member of staff at the gate in the mornings as they have many other responsibilities and the message my not get passed on.
- Any medical appointments must be supported with evidence in order for these to be authorised - please bring these in to the front office.
- Please remember that the school are able to administer Calpol (with parental consent) and often this is enough to keep a child feeling well enough to be in school. If we are ever concerned about a child, we will always ring home.

It is also worth bearing in mind that if you have made the decision early morning to keep your child at home and by mid-morning they've made a miraculous recovery then please do bring them in - we would prefer a child comes in late than not at all!

With the recent changes to Government restrictions around COVID, we as a School have now been advised to begin recording absences relating to COVID as an illness. This means that if your child tests positive and is therefore off School, the absence will impact on their attendance.

Government advice is that while legal self-isolation rules have been lifted, anyone testing positive is advised to stay at home for at least five full days.

A story before bedtime is another essential part of our younger years and one which has the potential for lasting impact on our lives.

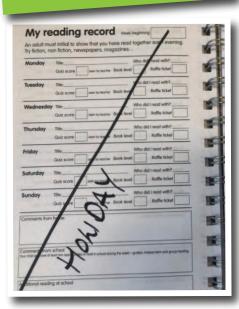
As you know we promote a love of reading, there is nothing I loved more than snuggling up at bedtime with my children and reading to them or listening to them read. It is magical and I really miss that now they are teenagers. Funnily enough they don't want me to read to them anymore!

There is nothing more important you can do to help your child succeed- the bonus is it reduces stress, anxiety, it's fun and relaxing.

Reading shouldn't be a chore, if your child doesn't want to read then just let them listen to you.

Five or ten minutes every evening really does make a difference. No one should be too busy for this.

Why?

Good reading at the age of 10 is a predictor of the number of GCSEs children will achieve and beyond that it can even predict future earnings at 42! Needless to say this is a positive correlation!

The children that are achieving less well in school and are being left behind are those children that are not reading daily at home. It is really important that children leave year 2 being fluent, secure readers or the gaps widen and become increasingly hard to close.
